Week of Love and Care September 30 - October 8, 2017

There exit a great deal of human need and suffering in your community. If unemployment and homelessness are not present in large numbers, there is divorce, domestic violence, disease, and loneliness.

In October 1995, social assistance benefits were cut by 21.6% across the province of Ontario, causing immense hardship for families already struggling to make ends meet. The cuts to benefits had an immediate, staggering effect on the ability of households receiving social assistance to pay for shelter. A single parent with one child receiving social assistance would potentially have had to pay 73% of her income on rent in Toronto, 56% in Hamilton, 65% in Ottawa and 60% in Windsor.

In all likelihood, the numbers described above actually under-estimate the severity of the affordability problems facing low income households, both employed and in receipt of public assistance, in Ontario.

The crisis of homelessness in Ontario is far more than what you see on the streets. Women and children are by far the largest groups affected by the cuts and by the erosion of income.

To get a truer sense of the hardship faced by people receiving social assistance it is important to isolate the impact of rent increases on the money which is left over for non-shelter items such as food, clothing and transportation.

The Community Services Department is once again challenging every member of the church to do something positive for his/her neighbour in 2016. We would like to let Ontario know, we are willing to make a difference.

The people of Ontario must know that we are indeed the people of God by our love.

We have chosen the week of September 30 - October 8 as our Community Services Week of Love and Care. Our Grand Finale will be Sunday October 8, 2017.

This is a week in which we would like to show love and care to at least 50,000 disadvantaged individuals across Ontario. How are we going to do this? Get a good map of your area and draw a circle on it to define the area where you are most likely to find your target group.

Acquire a map which shows the Postal Code boundaries.

Using the location of your church or ministry as the center point, draw a circle based either on the following guideline.

- 1. If your church is located in an urban neighbourhood, draw a circle 5 Kilometers out from the center.
- 2. If your church is located in a suburban community, draw a circle 10 kilometers out from the center.
- 3. If your church is located in a small town or rural area, draw a circle 24 Kilometers out from the center

We would like to encourage every member to participate in a conferencewide community services initiative called "A Week of Love and Care." The dates chosen are *Sunday, September 30 to Sunday, October 8, 2017* with the *Grand Finale being Sunday, October 8, 2017*.

By mobilizing our members to volunteer their time; using their skills, to minister to the community, would allow each member to help in areas where they are most comfortable and competent.

Some of the programs we can do at this time may include, but not limited to the following:

- Visit the sick and shut-in
- Resume clinic
- Dental check
- Food preparation
- Feed the homeless
- Distribute clothing/bedding
- Community surveys
- Street Ministry
- Sewing class
- First aid class
- Senior citizen lunches
- Hairdressing
- Barbering
- Health check
- Gardening
- Harvesting
- Driving
- Packaging
- Other(s):

Our first order of business is to prepare the church and then the community.

The Church

- 1. Survey your church to get a sense of its areas of strength.
- 2. Analyse the information from the survey to determine what your church perceive to be some of the major needs in the community.
- 3. The survey will show you the skills your members are willing to use to help with the community outreach programs.
- 4. You will know from the survey the number of volunteer hours your members are willing to give to the programs.
- 5. Use the information collected to develop outreach programs that will harness the skills of your members for such programs.
- 6. Ask each member to donate in cash the equivalent of one or two meals. That should be at least \$5.00-\$10.00 from each member.
- 7. Prepare a financial plan (a budget, if you like), for the program.
- 8. Submit your budget to the Conference Community Services Director for some financial help by or before **15 July 2017**.

The Community

- 1. Get to know the needs of your community through research.
- 2. Survey the community to establish what some of their major needs are.
- 3. Know where the disadvantaged people can be found in and around your community.
- 4. Tell the community ahead of time about the program(s) your church would be bringing to them in September.
- 5. Set the stage for a smooth and well coordinated program.

The Plan

January-February

Discuss the program with your Community Services team first. Secondly, take it to the Personal Ministries Council. Thirdly, take the whole program to the Church Board to be voted as an action. Once it has been voted by the Church Board, present the program to the church.

February-March

Survey the Church

March-April

Survey the Community

April-May

Study the data you gathered from the Church and the Community. Choose the programs that will best utilize the skills of the majority of your members.

Add up the total number of volunteer hours your members are willing to commit to the Week of Love and Care.

May-June

Start working to establish the programs your church will be running in September.

Ascertain the level of support from your church.

If additional funds are required, work with your Pastor, Treasurer and church board to determine how the funding can be obtained.

July-August

Send the following to the Community Services Department:

- 1. The number of volunteers from your church.
- 2. The number of volunteer hours promised.
- 3. The amount of funds budgeted for the program.

The Community Services Department recognize that: (1) there is a role for every member of the church to play helping our neighbour. We cannot all do everything, but we can all do something. (2) We are to share our faith with the rich and the poor, the high and the low. We must treat every individual, regardless of their status, as potential candidates for the kingdom of God. Jesus accepted the hospitality of all classes, visiting the homes of the rich and the poor, the learned and the ignorant, and seeking to elevate their thoughts from questions of commonplace life to those things that are spiritual and eternal.

August-September

Recheck all potential programs to see if there are any deficiencies and to take corrective action to remedy them.

Work with your pastor(s) and the Communications leader to prepare a statement or Press release to be given to your local newspaper(s) and Radio Station(s). The statement should include the number of volunteer hours your church would be giving to the community on September 3-11, 2016.

Ideas for Holiday Ministry (ACS)

How does your church reach out to the community during the holiday season? Here are some ideas you could use this year.

Out of the cold. Offer your church facility as a shelter during the cold nights for those who are homeless in the community.

Coat collection. Most people have at least a couple of extra coats, plus accessories such as gloves, scarves, and hats sitting in the closet. Why not connect with a community organization and partner in their annual coat drive? You could even make your church a drop-off site.

Caroling. On Friday night or Sabbath afternoon, send groups from your church caroling in the surrounding neighborhoods. Consider distributing home baked treats and invitations to your church's Christmas and New Year's Eve programs.

Food baskets. Find creative ways to contribute to a local food pantry. You could go door-to-door can collecting or even hold a contest to see which Sabbath school class could donate the most food. Make it something the whole church can get excited about.

Holiday meals. Your church could host a Thanksgiving or Christmas meal for people who might not be able to prepare their own or who don't have anyone to spend the holiday with. Many of your church's families might also enjoy the chance to celebrate Thanksgiving together.

Soup kitchen. Recruit church members to serve a holiday meal at a soup kitchen. You could also distribute warm clothing and provide games for the children.

Community-friendly service. Plan a candlelight Christmas Eve service with lots of favorite Christmas songs followed by a reception with treats and hot drinks. You could also feature a nativity play. Be sure to invite the community. You could also plan a family-friendly New Year's Eve party with plenty of activities for children, teens, and adults.

Gifts that last a lifetime. Instead of getting gifts for all your friends at church, you could choose something from ADRA's Useful Gift Catalog to give in their honor. Visit www.adra.ca for ideas.

Snow Cleaning. Offer to clean the snow for those in your community who need the help.

Promote your activities. Be sure to include information about holiday programs on the church website. People in the community would be interested. Also be sure to have your plans listed on community calendars with the local newspaper and radio and television stations.

Let the love of continue to shine through as you fellowship with all of God's children.
